## Headteacher's Message

Hello.

This week, four of our children have been in isolation due to Covid-19 and no staff members. In case you missed it, Health Secretary Sajid Javid announced yesterday that the self-isolation period following a positive test for Covid-19 will be cut to five full days from Monday 17<sup>th</sup> January. People will be able to leave isolation on day 6, after producing negative lateral flow test results on days five and six of their isolation. Please note that day 1 is the day following either a symptom beginning, or a positive test result, whichever occurred first. Also, it has been clarified that neither asymptomatic nor symptomatic individuals need to arrange confirmatory PCR tests after a positive lateral flow test result.

Schools are expected to incorporate the 5 'British Values' into their curriculum: these are democracy, rule of law, mutual respect, individual liberty and tolerance of different values and beliefs. Throughout the year, our school has a 'big question' linking to these values and this term we are focussing on 'mutual respect'. This fits beautifully as it is also one of our three school expectations (be respectful, be ready, be safe). Our big question is 'What does it mean to me?' and classes are exploring this is in a wide variety of different ways. I have seen such thoughtful and interesting work around this theme over the last week or so; it is a joy how considerate the children are and how they are able to consider and express the many positive qualities that respect elicits in a person, such as being inclusively kind and caring.

## The Bloodaxe Book Challenge

The Bloodaxe Book Challenge being run by York Explore Libraries and Archives and the JORVIK Viking Centre finishes Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> January. If you are taking part please come along to your local library by this Saturday to complete the challenge and collect your rewards. All children who complete the challenge will be invited to a visit by Cat Weldon author of the How to Be a Hero series on Sat 19<sup>th</sup> February. They will hear all about what it's like to be an author as well as lots of interesting facts and tales about what it was like to be a Viking.





#### **EYFS**

The children have had a lovely first full week back finding out about animals that live in the arctic and antarctic. They made polar bear hand prints and enjoyed painting their hands! We have investigated how salt melts ice and the children have enjoyed exploring ice independently in the outdoor classroom.



In phonics this week the children learnt the sounds y (as in yes), z (as in zap) and qu (as in quit). This weeks tricky words were 'he' and 'she' and the children also learnt how to write 'to' and 'the'.

At the beginning of the week, we learnt all about zero in maths. Our number work at the end of the week focussed on sharing numbers equally. We had a great number disco where we had to share equally with a partner. In our shape, space and measures session, the children learnt all about prepositions and became experts at moving their polar animals into different places e.g. under the bench, in between two things.

Just a reminder that the children only get free milk at school until they turn 5. If you would still like your children to have milk you will need to go through the 'cool milk' website where you can order milk for your child for a small cost. We have a snack for the children each day which consists of a piece of fruit or a vegetable. We are seeing a lot of children starting to bring in their own snacks; this is absolutely fine but could we ask that it is a healthy snack e.g. fruit, cereal bars or crackers and that it is nut free. Please can this just be a small amount as it is just a snack to keep us going until lunchtime.

We are off to the jungle next week to find out about jungle animals!

The children continued to use the atlases this week in geography. They showed off their super map reading skills whilst locating and naming rivers in the UK and major rivers around the world. They impressed us all with how well they had remembered how to find information using the different sections of the atlas, including the content page and index.



In art this week, we looked at how to mix colours and created our own pointillism colour wheels. The pointillism technique was a lot trickier than we thought it would be. The accuracy needed to get the dots close enough together with the added challenge of mixing two colours took a lot of concentration.
