#### **EYFS**

Animals that live in the desert was our focus for this week's topic work. We have been finding out about camels, lizards, scorpions, taratulas and tortoises. Our amazing facts for the week included learning that a desert tortoise only needs to drink water once a year.

Our maths work this week has focussed on numbers 5, 6 and 7. We have been making 7 in lots of different ways including finding lots of different ways to make 7 using Numicon.

Our outdoor maths lesson involved counting sets of objects and using dominoes to make an addition sentence.. we got really good at saying sentences such as "5 spots add 2 spots makes 7 spots altogether".



In phonics this week the children learnt the sounds ai (as in chain), ee (as in meet), igh (as in light) and oa (as in goat). This weeks tricky words to spell were 'no' and 'go' and to read; 'was'.



In our art sessions this week all the children made a wonderful snake out of pipe cleaners, beads, tissue paper and card. We were looking at the patterns of snakes and many children chose to create a repeating pattern with their beads.



We are really enjoying our chinese restaurant role-play area. It is going to be Chinese New Year next Tuesday. If anybody has any plastic or wooden play food at home they no longer require it would be gratefully received.

We are off on Safari next week!

# Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)

This week in science we have continued to explore and learn more about the properties of materials. We tested a range of materials to find out if they are bendy, transparent, opaque, waterproof or absorbent.

In English, we have continued our history theme. We wrote stories about Lottie's old toy room adventures and stepped through a mystery door which transported us back to a Victorian classroom. This acted as a stimulus when writing our next adventure story, focusing on adjectives, conjunctions and accurate punctuation.



In dance, we have been developing our own creative pieces based on the stimulus of seasons. Last week, our dance moves reflected winter activities and this week we focused on spring.

It has been a thoroughly engaging and thought-provoking week in Year 3 and 4. In PSHE, following on from our work about rights and responsibilities within our community, the children have been introduced to the Crisp Packet Project which recycles used crisp packets. They have started sharing some fantastic ideas for developing posters to help promote the idea to everyone around the school.





In science, we have continued working on our rocks topic. The children have started to learn about the rock cycle and deepened their understanding by discussing the process and the different stages of the rock cycle. As well as recapping the different types of rocks including Sedimentary, Igneous and Metamorphic.

When writing, we considered our choice of vocabulary carefully to ensure that we were creating the desired mood.

Year 1-2 Film Night will be on Thursday 10th February from 4.30-5.45pm.


Tickets will be £3 on the night, which includes a drink, a pack of sweets and a packet of popcorn. In addition, hotdogs can be bought for an extra £1.
