Good afternoon

We are especially proud of our Year 4 children who recently completed their statutory multiplication tables check and also our Year 1 children who completed their phonics screening check. We all support the children to understand that they can only do their best, and should try to do so, utilising their best resilience strategies at these times. We would like to say a massive well done to all of the children and a thank you to our Year 1 and Year 4 parents/carers, for all of the support we know you will have given at home to keep them going.

On Monday, our whole school assembly, which reinforced the school's ethos and values, focused on Refugee Week which takes place from 19th to 25th June. Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)



This week, our dinosaur topic has explored carnivores, herbivores and omnivores. The children have investigated the types of teeth these dinosaurs had and how this related to the type of food they ate. The children also learnt to look at the structure of the dinosaurs to help them to determine whether they were meat or plant eaters. For example, the stegosaurus had four short stompy

feet/legs, they moved slowly and they had flat teeth. The stegosaurus was a plant eating herbivore. In a related activity, the children found dinosaurs that had been hidden around our Reception areas. Then they studied them to determine if they were carnivores or herbivores and sorted them into a Venn diagram.

This week, in phonics, we have read words which have a suffix added to the end of them to change singular words into plural words. An example of this is sports, paints, frogs, boxes, scrunches and dresses. We also continue to revise and learn how to read and spell the tricky words here, little, says, by, my, like, some, come, love and do.



In maths, we have learnt all about odd and even numbers. The children enjoyed exploring pairs to decide if a number was odd or even. They also designed and drew some brilliant Oddosaurus using their knowledge of odd numbers. Some dinosaurs had 3 legs, 5 spots and 9 sharp teeth.

Next week, the children will be using reclaimed materials to make dinosaur sculptures. Please can you send any clean recycling into school with your child on Monday morning? Cereal boxes, egg cartons - most recycling will suit the job! The more materials we have the more creative their sculptures will be! Any questions, please ask any member of the team. Thank you for your help.

This week, we are learning why dinosaurs' teeth were very important. This had led to us studying our teeth and how we can keep them healthy. It would be lovely to see how the children keep their teeth healthy at home. Please share this on Tapestry so that we can discuss their top tips during our PSED session next week. Library visit reminder – next week Class 1 will return and select new books.

On Friday 30th June, our Reception children will be visiting St Mary's Church in Haxby. We will be meeting with Rev Kathryn who will talk to the children about how Christians belong to the wider Christian family. She will also be performing a 'mock baptism' so the children can learn about this Christian family practice. This will enhance our recent RE teaching of the unit 'Where do we belong?'

Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)


The summer sun may not have been as consistent this week but our wonderful Key Stage 1 children have continued to shine in their own right! It has been a busy and exciting week full of learning and exploration.




We have been particularly pleased to welcome some new additions to the Key Stage 1 classrooms. No, we don't mean new children; we mean, of course, the caterpillars! Each class now has a number of caterpillars in a jar that arrived at the end of last week. As part of our recent work on life cycles (of butterflies in particular), we now have the first-hand opportunity

to watch them grow, form a chrysalis and transform into butterflies! We have already learned about metamorphosis and what to expect so we are very excited to be able to witness this and record all of the changes we see in our special caterpillar diaries.

This week in English, we have been looking at another life cycle: that of a frog. Frogs are another creature that undergoes an amazing metamorphosis: they start as frog spawn; hatch into tadpoles and then change completely as they reach adulthood. This process includes amazing changes to their bodies, and a complete switch in their diet and habitat. As well as this, gills and limbs move from the outside to the



inside of their bodies and vice versa! We wrote explanation texts to describe this process, using all of the features used in last week's writing. The resulting writing was excellent.



It's not just living creatures that can change over time: towns and cities grow and evolve too! We have started to study the history of York and look at how it has changed over time. We looked at the features of York that have been around for a long time (such as the walls, timber framed buildings and the Minster) and how they can still be seen when we walk through the city today. We also thought about how modern features such as roads and modern buildings had been integrated with the old as the city has changed over time in order to meet the needs of the people living there. We really are lucky to live so close to such a beautiful and interesting place!

Well done Key Stage 1. As always, you have achieved so much this week through your positive, inquiring approach to learning and your hard work. Enjoy the weekend and we shall see you again on Monday.



Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

The children have continued to be inspired by Georgia O'Keeffe in art this week. To begin with, they experimented with watercolours and tested out different techniques including wet on wet, spreading paint, dry brush and gradations. Afterwards, they used these techniques and painted the sketches of their flowers that they drew last week. We were



all very impressed with the beautiful paintings that the children produced and how quickly they mastered mixing water colours and using different brush techniques.



Science this week was all about flowers and seeds. We looked at the fascinating structure of a flower, labelled each part and learnt about the function of each part required in the production of seeds. We also learnt how flowers attract insects to help pollinate them and how important insects are in the life cycle of a flower. Following on from looking at how seeds are formed, we discovered more about the amazing ways they are dispersed including hitching a ride with an animal, wind, water and even by explosion! The children wrote and drew some amazing explanations of how seeds are dispersed. Well done!

The Year 3 children have loved using the boomwhackers during their music lessons this term learning how to play tunes that they are familiar with. Alongside this, they have been listening carefully to music, appraising it and sharing their opinions on different styles of music. The Year 4 children have continued to learn how to play the violin in their WCET lessons and have continued to improve their notation skills.



Reminder: Next week, each class will be taking part in two sessions of Pedestrian training (Monday to Wednesday). Please ensure that your child has suitable clothing in school including a raincoat and sun hat.
