## Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)

This week has been 'Goldilocks and The Three Bears' week.
We have continued our Traditional Tales journey by building beds for the bears out of Lego, cutting and decorating porridge pictures, acting out the story and writing a letter from Goldilocks to apologise for her behaviour.


We have also enjoyed reading ‘The Ghanaian Goldilocks’ story too. The children learnt about and made their own Kente cloth which is a beautifully patterned material from Ghana.

Our phonics lessons, this week, have consolidated the teaching of 'air' and 'er'. We have practised reading and writing words with these phonemes and also practised reading words which have digraphs (two letters that make one sound)
 with double letters, for example, rr, gg, bb and dd. Some of the words read this week include rubber, shimmer and digger. To practise these phonemes at home, please refer to the homework activity.

In Maths, this week, we have compared numbers within 10. This included picking up two handfuls of counters, counting them out onto a tens frame and then comparing which tens frame had more/fewer counters. The children have also continued to learn about repeating patterns and linked these to their Kente cloth making.


Over the last two weeks, we have begun to learn how to use Beebots, which are computerised bees that move with coding instructions. The children have been learning how to operate the Beebots, using the forward, backward, left and right buttons. They have had great fun directing them on the story map of The Gingerbread Man.

As the weather has been fine (on some days) this week, the children have greatly enjoyed exploring the provision in our outdoor classroom. Some activities have included, building chairs and beds for The Three Bears, creating a stage and performing musical performances for an audience and being creative in the sand kitchen.

## Key Stage 1 (Years 1 \& 2)

We don't need the daylight hours to be longer to have bright days in Key Stage 1. Every day, the children continue to wow us with their hard work and determination to succeed. This week we have continued to learn about book reviews; we brought in
 our favourite books from home and used what we had learned last week to write reviews about them. Again, we included a summary of the plot and a description of the main characters and settings, before describing our favourite scene and giving a star rating. What was even more incredible than the quality of the work, was the variety of books that were brought in.


In maths, we consolidated our knowledge of multiplication and division methods and used these skills to solve a variety of problems. It was impressive to see how independent our children were in using practical and pictorial methods to represent calculations and solve them accurately, as well as their confidence in using times table and counting knowledge too. We also revisited time and continued to sharpen our skills at telling the time on an analogue clock. Some of us were even able to tell the time to 5 minute intervals!


In RE, we were looking at sacred places and the types of buildings that are very important to different groups of people (i.e. churches for Christians, mosques for Muslims and synagogues for Jews). We learned about the features of these buildings and the special significance of many parts of them. We even designed a stained glass window for a synagogue. In science, we got hands on with a practical investigation to find out how different materials can change state by squashing, bending, twisting and stretching. We made predictions about which materials would be affected, and how, then conducted our own investigations to explore what really
 happened.

On Friday, Class 3 performed their class assembly to the children of Key Stage 1 and their parents, showcasing some of the fabulous learning they have conducted this year. It was a smorgasbord of music, artwork, reading and PE as the children displayed their skills and knowledge. It was great to see so many children reading and speaking so confidently in front of an audience, we were all very proud of their effort. Well done Key Stage 1. Keep shining!

## Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 \& 4)

The Year 3 and 4 children have had another very busy and fun week preparing for our Hoodwinked performance.

This week in English, the children are focusing on instructions and have made their own cast fossil of a dinosaur using clay, mini dinosaurs to make the imprint and plaster of Paris. Whilst making their cast fossil, the children noted down all of the equipment they required and drew each step to help them recall the steps when they write their instructions. We are all really looking forward to seeing what they look like when we reveal them next week.


Our English work linked brilliantly with our science 'Rocks' topic. This week, the children have found out about Mary Anning's contribution to the field of Palaeontology, looked closely at a variety of fossils and sketched a selection of fossils including all of the fine details that they could see through a magnifying glass.

In PSHE this half term, the children are learning about families and close relationships. Last week, the children discussed how families are all different for example, some children live with
 mum and dad, others with grandparents, some have two dads or two mums and some have stepparents. Afterwards, the children drew their own family, labelled their picture with family members and annotated it to show what their family provides which included key words such as love, support and shelter. This week, the children continued to discuss how families can support each other, identify when people need help and support and how to help each other. The children were amazing at identifying ways to help and support siblings, parents/carers and other members of their family as well as who they would go to for support if they needed it.

## Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 \& 6)

This week, as part of our new RE unit, we have been reflecting upon our personal understanding of what is meant by a 'soul'. We discussed the belief held by many that after death some aspects of us may continue. The children
 were given space, time and resources to capture their ideas about the spirit or soul in words, pictures or other appropriate form.


In science, we reviewed all of our learning on the topic of light. We recalled that light appears to travel in straight lines; how we see objects; how we see our reflection in a mirror; that shadows have the same shape as the objects that cast them; the definitions of reflection and refraction.

In Mr Tod's maths set, following the success of our work on finding the fraction of a shape, we have moved onto comparing fractions.
In order to do this, we must first calculate equivalent fractions. In
 Mrs Fitzpatrick's and Mrs Stephenson's set, we have learnt the necessary strategies used to find $10 \%, 5 \%$ and $1 \%$ of a given amount; this then enabled us to calculate a percentage of a number (eg. $37 \%$ of 3,600 ). We have also started to work out the perimeter of rectilinear and compound shapes. In Mr Bennett's set, we have looked at calculating angles on a straight line and around a point. We have then calculated missing angles within triangles, quadrilaterals and polygons.
