Acting Headteacher's Message

Enhancing Our Outdoor Provision

As part of our School Development Plan (SDP), one of our key priorities this year is to further enhance our outdoor play provision. We know that high-quality outdoor play supports exciting, creative and imaginative experiences for children, while also developing important life skills such as resilience, teamwork, problem-solving and independence. Outdoor play also contributes greatly to children's health, wellbeing and social development.

To achieve this, we want to make greater use of both our playground and school field, giving children more opportunities to play, explore and enjoy being outdoors throughout the year.

Our first step will be the purchase of a large shed to safely store the new resources we plan to invest in. To make this possible, we are looking for someone (or a company) who would be willing to take the lead in organising and carrying out the preparation work. This would involve clearing the overgrown garden/grassed area and laying the base for the shed. By leading on this project, you would allow us to direct more of our funds towards high-quality resources that will directly benefit the children, rather than having to pay for external contractors.

Our second planned purchase is outdoor wellington boot storage, which will allow the children to make full use of the school field in all weathers. Again, we are keen to find someone who could take ownership of this stage of the project — from design through to construction.

We would be delighted to recognise and thank any local businesses or individuals who take on these projects, including through our newsletters, social media and school website.

If you, or someone you know, would be interested in leading one of these exciting projects, please contact the school office. By stepping forward, you'll be making a lasting difference for our children and the wider school community.

- Bus stops
- Dropped kerbs
- Zigzag lines outside of schools

Parking services can issue a parking ticket (penalty charge notice, or PCN) - a parking fine - for each of these offences.

Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)

Wow! What a busy week we have had in Reception this week.

This week in **phonics**, we have learnt four new phonemes: ck, e, u and r. It was exciting to be introduced to our first digraph (2 letters that make one sound) 'ck'. We normally find this at the end of words. For example, duck, peck, sock.

Once children have an ability to sound out and blend words, we begin to read books with words. Some children will soon be bringing home these books. This will mean that your child has securely shown an ability to sound out and blend words together. Please don't worry if your child remains on books with no words for a while, as blending practise happens daily in school.



In maths this week, we have continued to explore the numbers 1, 2 and 3. This included counting and representing these numbers on a tens frame. We played a game which you could play at home too. Clap your hands and ask your child how many claps they heard or drop items





We have now started our REAL PE sessions in the hall each week. This half term we are focusing on ball skills including, controlling the ball with a foot and chasing a rolling ball. The adults are already seeing improvements in how independently the children are getting

changed for PE. One thing which we would value your continued support with is practising to turn sleeves and tights/trousers legs the correct way round to put them on.

Next week, the children will be learning about people who help us in our community. As part of this, we would like to make emergency vehicles in our creative area. If you have any small boxes or clean bottle tops which we can use, please do save them and bring them into school.

Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)



It has been yet another busy week in Key Stage 1, full of learning and fun. This week, we enjoyed learning more about habitats and microhabitats in science. A microhabitat is a small -scale habitat for creatures, such as in a patch of long grass or under a log or large stone. We learned about how these provide shelter and protection for a wide range of creatures and explored some for ourselves, using maps to show where they could be found in the school

grounds. We then made a habitat triorama (three-sided scene) in English and used what we knew about instruction writing to write a set of instructions for how to make one.

In RE, we continued to learn about the Islamic faith. This week, we were exploring Islamic artefacts and learning about their significance to Muslims. We looked at Qur'ans, prayer mats and other important objects and talked about their importance, symbolism and use. It was so fascinating to see them and to learn about how they are used in daily life.






In computing, we have been learning to access and navigate Purple Mash by searching for it and using our username and password to access the platform. These login details are now stuck on labels in both of your child's homework folders so they can access Purple Mash at home. This is a great resource, full of amazing activities and tools. Your child might enjoy sharing what they are learning in computing with you, but there are many other activities on there to support with learning in other

areas of the curriculum, such as maths, spelling and English. In computing, we were accessing paint programs and writing tools and learning how to save and retrieve work. It can be tricky to be independent on the computer but our children have been doing so well and we are very proud of them

Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

Last week, as part of our 'Ancient Egyptians', 'All wrapped Up' history topic we designed our cartouches using hieroglyphics. This week, the classroom was filled with excitement (and a lot of mess!) as the children brought their designs to life using clay. After rolling out their slabs of clay and cutting them into the shape of a cartouche, they showed great concentration and skill while carving or moulding their chosen hieroglyphs. The results were absolutely fantastic; the children produced wonderful cartouches that they should feel very proud of!





As part of our history and English sessions over the last couple of weeks, the children looked at a set of gruesome mummification instructions that explained how the

mummification process was carried out. To bring this to life, the children took on the role of a scientist and had a go at mummifying apple quarters. They created their own version of natron by mixing salt and bicarbonate of soda, then buried their apple pieces in the mixture to see how well it preserved them. When we checked the results, there was a real mixture of outcomes, some apples were soggy and unpleasant, while others were amazingly well preserved. Although the outsides had turned black, many of the insides looked surprisingly fresh.



After writing their own set of brillaint mummfication instructions, the children have moved on to reading the story 'The Gold In the Grave' which is based on King Tutankhamun. We have spent some time reading the story and creating our own story board of the main events and included key vocabulary to help us really understand the structure of the story.

In PSHE this week, we revisited the Zones of Regulation to deepen the children's understanding of their emotions. We talked about how our bodies respond to different feelings. For example, nervousness might give us butterflies in our stomach. The children were very reflective and



thoughtful as they discussed their own experiences. They also recognised that everyone responds to emotions differently, and they showed great respect for each other's ideas.

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
Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)



As part of our RE learning this week, we reflected on Christian beliefs about the creation of the world. We explored both the biblical creation story and scientific ideas, such as the Big Bang theory. As a class, we discussed how Christians can hold different viewpoints. For example, some believe that God initiated the Big Bang, while others interpret the creation story in the Bible literally.

In our PE sessions this half term, we have been learning about invasion games. We were introduced to a simplified version of netball, where we worked with our teammates to move the ball into the scoring zone. Through these lessons, we developed our ball control and handling skills by practising different ways of passing and catching, while also improving our coordination and control of the body when in possession of the ball.





This term, we have begun to learn how to use 2Connect - on Purple Mash - as a tool to help us organise our learning and to collaborate. By creating boxes, we can organise information much like a thought shower. 2Connect will also allow us to connect web links and further information to some of our ideas. We can also link different boxes with arrows and, should one side begin to look crowded, reorganise the entire document by moving the information around. Additionally, 2Connect has a

collaborative setting which allows the whole class to contribute their ideas to one document. This is especially useful when we are discussing a new concept or wish to share our ideas.

The Year 6s thoroughly enjoyed their trip on Tuesday to the Merchant Adventurers' Hall to give the children a chance to recall important dates and events in British history. They took part in a debate to decide who should be admitted to the hospital and role played at being entrepreneurs in the 1850s.
