Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)

This week, the children have been enjoying finalising their roles in our nativity 'A Wriggly Nativity'. Thank you for your help in providing costumes and sending them in to school. Bringing together the acting, character lines and songs has brought the nativity to life and we are very much looking forward to sharing it with you next week. **Our performance is Wednesday 10th December at 2:45pm.**



In **phonics** this week, the children have applied their knowledge of the phonemes learnt so far this year, to continue to practise sounding out and blending words to both read and spell them. They have also continued to practise reading words which add 's', for example, cups – sings – tins.



Using our phonics knowledge has helped the children to write a short sentence about their role in our nativity story. When we write words, captions or sentences, the children plan what they are going to write and then say the sounds they can hear in the words, for example, d-o-g. Some

children wrote 'I am a king'.

On Monday, some exciting visitors appeared in Reception. The Christmas tricky word elves have arrived! The children were introduced to the tricky word elf challenge. Each day, the children will be looking out for the Christmas elves and reading their tricky words. We will keep you updated!





In **maths** this week, we have learnt different ways of making 5. The children decorated Christmas trees with five baubles, for example, 3 red and 2 blue. Then they recorded their additions in a number sentence.

Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)

We are heading into one of busiest and most exciting times of year in Key Stage 1. The children have been getting festive this week as we prepare to perform our nativity. There has been much fun and excitement putting the show together and it has come together marvellously. We were very excited to try on our costumes and do a rehearsal in them. And it was very exciting to perform in front of the rest of the school on Friday when we did our dress rehearsal. For many of us, it was the first time performing in front of such a large audience and we were all so proud of the amazing job the children did and how they shone on stage. We can't wait to perform to our families and friends when we do the real thing.





In English, we have been writing our own stories inspired by "The Runaway Iceberg", which we enjoyed last week. In our version of the story, two polar bear cubs were playing on an iceberg when it cracked and floated away. They had adventures drifting in the sea and were helped by lots of other characters before they eventually found their way home to their families. The children followed the familiar structure and wrote their own

stories, including ambitious adjectives and exciting vocabulary. The results were amazing! We were thrilled and delighted by the exciting stories they wrote.

On Thursday, the author Tony Bower, Reverend Kathryn and Alison Hutchinson came into school and worked with a group of children, talking about the Christmas Story. They acted out part of the story with the children and asked us to think about how the shepherds felt at different parts of the story when they were visited by the angels and given the important news. We then made pieces of artwork of scenes from the Christmas story, which will be shown in our carol service in church and then displayed. The children were so respectful and took lots of care to create wonderful pieces of artwork.



We are looking forward to welcoming parents, carers, families and friends to our nativity performances next week. We will be performing to the families of Year 1 on Monday afternoon and to the families of Year 2 on Tuesday afternoon. Due to time limitations, the performances need to start promptly at 2.30pm. 
Well done Key Stage 1. We are in a very interesting and exciting time of year and we are so proud of how well you are meeting every new experience and challenge.

Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

In art, the children have explored the colour wheel and investigated how the primary colours, red, yellow and blue can be mixed to create secondary colours. After experimenting with colour mixing, we revisited the painting technique pointillism which was introduced during our artist study on Georges Seurat. Using cotton buds as their painting tool, the children created their own vibrant colour wheels made entirely of tiny dots.

Creating our own colour wheels really helped consolidate the children's understanding of how different colours blend together and we can't wait to use this knowledge to paint our own river scenes using the pointillism technique.





Throughout the autumn term, the Year 3 and 4 children have been using TT Rockstars regularly in class to practise their times tables. They have thoroughly enjoyed challenging themselves to beat their previous soundcheck scores while the studio section has helped them improve the speed and accuracy of their recall. It has been wonderful to see so many

certificates awarded and to watch the children rise through the Rockstar ranks. Keep up the fantastic effort, everyone!

This week we reached the exciting finale of our class novel 'The Ancient Egypt Sleepover'. The ending certainly kept us on the edge of our seats, with a dramatic chase through the museum as Mo and Debbie devised a master plan to stop the fake professor from escaping with the precious treasure. They even managed to trap Draven, the professor's partner in crime, inside King Tut's coffin! As part of our reading activities, the children wrote short book reviews, sharing their favourite parts of the story and how much they have enjoyed the mystery and suspense that kept them guessing until the very end. Luckily, Mo and Debbie did succeed and the Professor (Maria) was caucht red handed with the




and Debbie did succeed and the Professor (Maria) was caught red handed with the treasure whilst dangling from a tree!

Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)



This week in science, we explored the incredible world of microorganisms. We discovered that these finy living things are everywhere - in the air, on surfaces and even inside our bodies - yet we can't see them without a microscope. We began by learning how scientists classify microorganisms into groups such as bacteria, fungi and protists. As we looked at magnified images, we compared their shapes, how they move and how they

feed. It was amazing to realise how different they all are, even though they are so small. We understood how classification helps us make sense of the microscopic world and we were left with a new appreciation for the helpful - and sometimes harmful - microorganisms all around us.

In history, we explored how the arrival of the railway changed life in Britain, and it became clear just how powerful this invention was. The impact was felt everywhere - from the way people travelled to the food they are and the jobs they worked. As part of our work, we mapped out some of the early railway lines connecting major cities and considered some of the benefits that rail travel brought to the UK. When the first railways were built in the 1800s, journeys that once took days could suddenly be completed in hours. For the first time, ordinary people were able to travel quickly between towns and cities. This meant families could visit distant relatives,



workers could find jobs further from home and businesses could grow faster than ever before. Railways also transformed trade. Fresh food such as milk, fish and vegetables could now be transported across the country before it spoiled. This changed diets and made previously local products available nationwide. Coal, iron and manufactured goods could be moved cheaply and in huge quantities, helping factories grow and boosting Britain's economy. We learnt that, overall, the railway's arrival marked the beginning of a faster, more connected nation, and its impact can still be felt today.



This week in PSHE, we explored the importance of respectful listening - a skill that supports our learning, strengthens our friendships and helps us grow into thoughtful members of our community. We discussed how listening means showing that we value the speaker by facing them, keeping our bodies still and giving them our full attention. We also talked about how respectful listening helps everyone feel safe and confident to share their ideas. Additionally, we explored a range of scenarios linked to the 9

Protected Characteristics and considered how someone might feel if they were not treated with respect. We followed this by discussing the different ways we could show respect in each situation and what this would look like in our behaviour and choices.

Children in UKS2 are also preparing for our Carol Service which takes place at 9:30am on Tuesday 16th December, at St Mary's Church.
