

New School Policy

School Meal Provisions and Debt Management

This policy (click here to view) has been adopted to ensure that there is a consistent and fair approach to debt incurred by parents/carers whose children eat school meals. When a child's school meal incurs a charge (e.g. Year 3 onwards), payments are expected from parents/carers meals in **advance** of the meals being required. The school budget is directly affected by any outstanding debts that cannot be recovered, thereby directly affecting all pupils in school. We are confident that every parent/carer will agree that this is unacceptable, and we encourage that all parents/carers give this policy their full support.

This week has been 'The Three Billy Goats Gruff' week.

We have enjoyed reading the traditional tale and exploring different skills through this theme. The children have built bridges for the billy goats out of a range of materials. They have also enjoyed retelling the story using characters and props. In literacy, they have continued to develop their writing skills by writing captions and sentences to tell the story. We are very impressed with how the children are using the phonemes taught and improving their handwriting.

Our phonics lessons, this week, have consolidated the teaching of a range of digraphs. We have practised reading and writing words with these phonemes and also practised reading words which have digraphs (two letters that make one sound) with the ending 'er'. Using our phonics home learning activities are a great way for you to continue to practise our daily phonics lessons at home.

In maths, this week, we have continued to embed learning about the numbers 1-10. We have particularly focussed on spotting representations of the numbers, counting sets of objects and using our knowledge of what smaller numbers look like to help us spot larg-

On World Book Day, the children thoroughly enjoyed sharing favourite stories. They read with our Year 5 and 6 children, designed their own wooden spoon story character, met the author Laura Henry Allain (virtually) and enjoyed being in their comfy reading clothes. The children shared such a buzz about reading. What a lovely way to spend a day!






Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)

It has been yet another jam-packed week of learning in Key Stage 1 with lots of exciting

events happening throughout the week. On Thursday, of course, it was World Book Day: a day designed to promote a love of reading in children. There was a special assembly with Mrs Stephenson and it was lovely to see everyone (children and staff) dressed in their comfy reading clothes. From





the bed to the beach, reading is a fun way to relax and

let your imagination soar. All the children were given a wooden spoon, which they decorated to make a story character. The results were amazing. They also made a book mark and had the opportunity to enjoy their love of books when the children from Key Stage 2 came to read with them. What an exciting day!

That wasn't the only special event this week, either! On Tuesday, the children took part

in a special space-themed science day: Mars Day. The children watched a special streamed broadcast from the European Space Agency which told us all about the challenges of space exploration, the exciting work that is currently going on to send astronauts back to the Moon and, in the future, to Mars and the types of inspirational people who become astronauts. It was amazing! We made rocket picture art and then used our knowledge of instruction writing to create a set of



instructions for how to do it. The children did an amazing job and were captivated by this wonderful, inspirational science.



We have also been loving our P.E. this half term; Joe has been coming in to teach us about cricket. We have practised our batting, bowling and fielding skills through fun activities and games. It has been so good to see the children learning new skills and having a wonderful time whilst doing so.

Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

The Year 3 and 4 children have had another busy, yet wonderful, week.



This week in reading, the children have continued to read 'Just Jack' by Kate Scott. The children are continuing to follow the journey Jack is embarking upon as he settles into his sixth new school. Ordinarily, Jack moves so regularly that he resists making new friends but this school is different. At school number six, he meets Tyler who is an imaginative, inventive, determined character who Jack cannot avoid being friends with. When predicting what they believe will happen next, the children have raised a number of questions such as, 'Will Jack stay at this school? Will Jack and Tyler stay friends?'

As per last week's newsletter, the children made mould and cast fossils as part of our English and science work. This week, the children successfully revealed their fossils. The mould fossil is the imprint of the toy dinosaur seen in the clay and the cast is the raised, 3D outline of the dinosaur.

In French, the children have been learning words and phrases linked to transport, ways of travel, days of the week and the weather. Previously, the

children have talked about how they travel to school (Je vais à l'école à pied) and asked the question 'Where are you going?' (Où vastu?). This week, the children revisited their pronunciation of words and recalled that final consonants in French words are not usually pronounced. The children then applied this knowledge when giving a weather report, for example, À Paris, il pleut (In Paris, it is raining).

For World Book Day, the children thoroughly enjoyed spending time together reading in class and sharing book recommendations. Each child also had the opportunity to create a wooden spoon character.






Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)



We have thoroughly enjoyed taking part in World Book Day this week. We came to school dressed in cosy clothes we find comfortable to read in. As part of our World Book Day activities, we designed and decorated a wooden spoon to represent a character from the book that we like. At the end of the day, we enjoyed taking the time to read with some of the younger children in school.

In science, we started our work on materials. We compared a number of materials and classified them into solids, liquids or gases. Using drama and diagrams, we compared the different states of matter; this led to a discussion about the changing states of matter under different conditions i.e. ice melting to become a liquid or a liquid becomes a gas.

Our computing lessons have focused on concatenation which is the process of combining two or more strings into a single larger string. It is an important function in programming and computing because it allows you to store and combine multiple pieces of data when needed. We worked through a sequence of activities to build up and debug a piece of code. It was imperative that we applied our previous learning about 'strings' in order to meet the lesson objectives.

We would like to congratulate the Year 6 children for their positive approach to their mock SATs tests this week. We look forward to seeing the Year 6 parents at the parents' evening meetings w/b 18^{th} March.
