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

Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)



We are so very proud of all the children, they certainly put on a sparkling performance of 'I-spy Christmas'. Their singing was beautiful and they have done an amazing job learning all the different Makaton actions. Thank you again for all your help with the costumes and your kind messages after the show.

In **phonics**, we have been revising and consolidating the learning of the forty sounds taught since the beginning of the autumn term. What an achievement! We continue to work very hard to learn how to blend words for our reading and segment words into different sounds that we can hear in our writing.

In **literacy**, the children have used their fantastic segmenting skills to write a list for Father Christmas. Some children have also written captions and sentences, for example, **a red hat** or **It is a rag doll**. They are becoming much more confident at segmenting words to spell them and recognising sentences/phrases. Maybe they could write a Christmas list for you at home!



Christmas activities have continued in the Reception classrooms this week and we have enjoyed lots of Christmas learning in our independent play. We have been rolling a dice to select a number of items to put upon a tree; decorating Christmas trees, being an elf or Father Christmas in our role play grotto, acting out stories in our Christmas small world play and designing Christmas trees in the loose

parts area. The most popular activity this week has definitely been a scissor control activity where the children had to cut Father Christmas' beard following the lines carefully.

We are looking forward to lots more Christmas activities next week, including our Christmas craft morning, Christmas party, Christmas Carol Service (on Tuesday afternoon) and of course Christmas dinner!

Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)




Christmas is just around the corner and the excitement is building in Key Stage 1. After weeks of planning and rehearsing, it was a pleasure to be able to perform 'The Nativity' for our families and friends. We performed our dress rehearsal to the school on Monday afternoon and then the shows to our families on Wednesday and Thursday afternoon. It was so exciting to see everything come together, with costumes, in a

wonderful display of music and acting that left our audiences wowed! The children did a marvellous job all the way through rehearsals, showing commitment and enthusiasm all along. Thank you to all the parents and carers who helped by organising costumes. And well done to the children who put on an amazing show!

As well as our show, we have been busy in the classroom too. This week in English, we have been solving and writing riddles. A riddle is a poem that is also a word puzzle. We started by solving some and then looked at how they were written in first person perspective, also how they contained a question and used verbs and adjectives to add precise



clues. We loved doing these! We then chose some Christmas characters and objects of our own to write our own riddles. We had to think about the order of our lines, putting the hardest clues first and the easiest ones last. When they were done, we played a guessing game, trying to work out which items other people had written about. It was lots of great fun and we thoroughly enjoyed writing and solving riddles.



In maths we have been learning about division, using the grouping method. This involves starting with a number of objects, subtracting equal groups until there are none left and then counting how many equal groups were made. In our maths story, Hector the Monkey was filling party bags with toys and treats and wanted to know how many bags he could fill. We related our practical work to

written calculations and used pictures to help us solve division problems.

We would like to remind everyone that our grandparents' Christmas craft morning will be on Monday and we are looking forward to seeing lots of our families there. On Wednesday morning we will be singing Christmas songs on the playground for our families and friends - we would love for you to join us!

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Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

Another busy yet very enjoyable week in Year 3 and Year 4!

In geography, we have continued to learn about rivers; this week, we focused in on the water cycle. The children learnt the various steps of the cycle including evaporation, condensation, precipitation and collection. To demonstrate how the water cycle works, the children drew the steps on a sandwich bag, with it then


being taped to the window. Whilst on the window, the water began to evaporate and form droplets on the inside of the bag. When the droplets became large, or joined to other droplets, they ran down the inside of the bag (precipitation) back into the water at the bottom (collection). The children thoroughly enjoyed seeing the process in action.



Over the last two weeks, in PE, all the children have participated in a KOBOCA 'Ultimate Warrior' virtual competition. The challenge involved the children completing 15 reps of several movements, one after the other, whilst being timed. The movements included: speed bounce (jumping over a cone whilst keeping your feet together), shuttle runs (running back and forth between 2 cones that were placed 5 meters apart), step ups (stepping up and down on a bench) and star

jumps. The challenge was hard but the children persevered and it was wonderful to see the children encourage each other and spur each other on.

To wrap up their science topic of 'Animals Including Humans', the children completed a double page spread to showcase all they have learnt over the term. The children drew images of the digestive system and how food was broken down and passed through the body; they recalled and drew the various teeth and their jobs and drew an example of a food chain. The children wonderfully recalled the knowledge they have gained from the Autumn term.

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Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)



In history, we have been learning about the impact of the railways on Britain. Using a map of the United Kingdom, we were able to plot the cities with stations and the rail lines that connected them. By examining primary sources, we began to appreciate that, until then, holidays were not available to most of the working population. We also found that this had a profound effect on trade across the World.

As part of our work in RE, we have been learning about how different faiths use their place of worship. This week, we considered how important a church is for Christians. Not only as a place of worship but as a community hub providing emotional and physical support. Additionally, we learnt that some Christians consider places of natural beauty to be spiritually similar to a church.



On Monday, we were delighted to hold our open classroom event to show case all the exciting lessons we have undertaken as part of our theme for this term 'All Change'; this included our history, art, English and DT work. In particular, the children really enjoyed showing parent/ carers their steam locomotives which they had created in design and technology sessions. Thank you to all who were able to attend.



On Monday, we walked to Joseph Rowntree Secondary School to see their production of Elf. All staff were delighted with our behaviour and the manners shown throughout the performance. We thoroughly enjoyed the songs and it was exciting to see some familiar faces in the cast! For many of the Year 5 pupils, it was their first opportunity to see inside a Secondary School and they were enthusiastic to talk about it when we returned to class.

Next week, we are looking forward to the Grandparents' Craft Morning on Monday, Year 5 and 6 Christmas Party on Monday afternoon, the Christmas Dinner on Tuesday, our KS2 Carol Service in the church on Wednesday and KS2 singing on the playground at ~9:00am on Thursday.
