# Acting Headteacher's Message

### Good afternoon

Our Year 6 children have been amazing this week, approaching their statutory tests with great attitudes and such positivity. We are really proud of every Year 6 child for the hard work that they have put in - even literally up to the last minute! We appreciate all the children in school for being supportive and patient, with keeping noise levels down and delayed breaktimes. Staff and visitors regularly comment on how very considerate and kind our children are across the school.

## Safeguarding

Safeguarding is a school's number one priority. At our school, we are committed to creating a safe, respectful, and caring environment where every child can thrive safely, both in person and online. While we hear or read about incidents involving children that take place in schools or online communities, we think, or hope, that such things won't happen in our own school. However, the attitude with safeguarding should always be 'it could happen here' and indeed it has.

Recently, we have had to respond to events involving a lack of consent in person (physical interactions without permission), as well as the sharing of content and information online. As a school community, it is essential to continue to remind and teach children, from a young age, about the importance of consent in all areas of their lives and how to the correctly use technology, which includes the use of social media.

We teach children about consent from Reception age. Understanding consent, whether in person or online, is an essential life skill. This includes understanding:

- The right to say "no" to physical contact of any kind or participation in photos or videos.
- The importance of asking permission before taking or sharing images, especially on social media.
- How to be kind, safe, and responsible when using technology: digital devices or apps.

We ask for your continued support at home in helping your child understand:

- The basics of digital safety.
- Why respecting others' personal space, images, and information matters.
- That social media (even when accessed indirectly) comes with responsibilities that children are still learning to manage.

We are here to support both children and families. If you ever have concerns or would like advice about how to talk to your child about these topics, please do not hesitate to reach out to us.

Please may we ask that every parent/carer checks their child(ren)'s phone, this weekend, and on an ongoing regular basis – ideally daily? Please also see our <u>online safety information</u> website page for further information, including factsheets about specific apps and online platforms. Thank you.

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# Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)

Our focus this week has been 'minibeast that live underground'. One of our favourite themed stories, this week, has been Superworm!




During the week, the children have had an opportunity to learn about different minibeasts that spend most of their day underground. In particular they learnt about worms, finding out where worms live. The children have really enjoyed learning the song 'There's a worm at the bottom of the garden...' We hope you enjoy our performance on Tapestry.



In phonics, we have continued to learn how to read and spell words with adjacent consonants. The children are doing very well with this and enjoying the new challenge. New tricky words learnt this week are, **there**, **what** and **one**.

In maths, we have focussed on adding two numbers together. To do this, the children have used tens frames, Numicon and number stories. For example,



First, there were 2 dinosaurs,

Then, 1 more dinosaur appeared,

Now, there are 3 dinosaurs.

We have very impressed by the children's ability to tell an addition number story.



It has been a beautifully sunny week and the children have thoroughly enjoyed exploring their learning in the outside classroom. This has involved lots of collaborative play which practises turn taking and further development of speech and language skills. The children have also kept themselves cool in water play and by building dens.






# Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)

This week in Key Stage 1 we have been on adventures around the world in our geography topic. We enjoyed a story called "Max and Lemon Around the World." In the story, a little girl called Max travels around the world trying to find people who are just like her. She visits amazing places and meets a wide range of people in other countries, discovering the ways in which they are similar and different to her. After this, we wrote diaries, pretending to be Max and talking about our adventures. We wrote in first person and past tense and used our



senses and imagination to bring our experiences to life. It was wonderful to see such vibrant writing: it was clear just how much we had enjoyed exploring the world through the story.



In geography, we have been learning about maps and how they represent the world around us. We practised by drawing a fictional map for the journey that Little Red Riding Hood might take to reach her grandmother's house. We learned about how maps are top-down views of the world and include permanent features such as buildings, rivers and roads. After this, we went on a walk around the school, exploring the areas and corridors of the building and how they connect. Afterwards, we used our knowledge to draw sketch maps of

the school. We had to use our memories to think carefully about how the rooms and corridors fitted together. It was quite a challenge but our children did such a good job of retracing their journey and thinking about how the corridors connected.

In science, we continued the theme of discovering the world around us. We were learning about trees and identifying them. We learned that all tree species have different leaves and these can be used to identify them. We looked at different examples and used a classification key to identify them. We also learned that there are two main types of tree: deciduous trees that shed their leaves in winter and evergreen trees that have needles all year round. As we named the species, we also classified the trees into these two groups. Next time you go on a walk, put our knowledge to the test!



Well done Key Stage 1. You continue to amaze us with your positive attitude and enthusiasm for learning.

# Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)



In Design Technology over the last couple of weeks, the children have been making their push along Roman Chariots. They have used a range of skills including accurate measuring, sawing, careful and detailed drawing, and colouring. After accurately measuring and cutting the pieces of wood, the children constructed a rectangular chassis and front frame for their chariot and learnt about the jinx technique as a way of providing extra strength and support to their structure. Once this was complete, they glued axel holders to

the chassis and cut two lengths of dowel, which will serve as the axels for their chariot. Alongside the construction elements of our lessons, the children referred back to their previously completed design sheets in order to carefully decorate their wooden wheels, the back, front and side sections of the chariot. Next week, once everyone has added their final touches to their chariots, we will be evaluating our designs and the making process.

In history this week, we have been learning about Roman roads and how important these were to the Roman Empire to be able to send messages quickly, transport supplies and to get soldiers from place to place easily. We were amazed to learn how many different ones there were. Once we had discovered the routes of the roads, we had a go at giving directions using the Roman road names to get from one place to another. For example, the Romans would have travelled along Ermine Street to get from London to York.





A massive well done to Class 8 for their super class assembly on Friday afternoon. Class 6 and 7 thoroughly enjoyed watching it and we hope that Class 8 parents / carers enjoyed it as much as we did.



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# Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)

As part of our work on databases, we recapped our understanding of what a database is - a set of data that is held on a computer and can be searched and sorted through. We discussed the software we have used previously on Purple Mash which included 2Question and 2Investigate. Using 2Investigate, we then set up our database; we decided what kind of data we wanted to collect and created the fields accordingly. Once we gathered and sorted the information, we then presented it in an appropriate format, such as a bar graph.





As part of music lessons, we learnt how to play a short melody, which included syncopation (the notes that don't land that don't 'land' on the beat). We listened to an example of jazz music and identified the instruments we could hear. After listening to the music, we discussed the composition of the piece and then learnt how to follow the musical score on a glockenspiel. With a little practise, we were soon playing as an ensemble. Some of us even went as far as playing a solo!

On behalf of all staff in the Upper Key Stage 2 team, we would like to express how proud we are of the way that the Year 6 children approached their assessments this week. The children were a credit to the school and themselves.
