### **Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)**

As part of our 'Amazing Animals' theme, this week we have taken a trip to the jungle. The children have enjoyed our text of the week 'Rumble in the Jungle' and many other jungle themed stories and factual texts. They have also looked on a world map to find where the jungles are and talked about the features of a jungle. Linked to our jungle work, the children have created



mosaic animal pictures, written animal riddles, created playdough models of jungle animals and used their cutting skills to create snake and monkey hanging decorations. What a busy week we've had!



zoom to the moo

In **phonics**, this week, the new phonemes learnt have been **oo** (as in zoom), **oo** (as in book), ar (as in farm) and or (as in born). We have enjoyed learning the catchphrases for each new grapheme and these are also on your child's homework sheet this week. We have also learnt new tricky words. These are words that cannot be sounded out as some of the sounds make a sound not expected. The words learnt have been, **was**, **you** and **they**. Your child may start spotting these words around them.

In **Maths**, this week, the children have investigated some new numbers in detail. These are the numbers **6**, **7** and **8**. They have investigated how these numbers can be made by using smaller numbers, using Numicon to build these. For example, 5 and 3 make



8 (5+3=8). Later in the week, we also explored adding and subtracting one more and one less than these numbers, using ten frames and counters.

This week, we have also taught and encouraged children to zip up their own coats. We are very impressed with their progress. Over this half term, we shall also be continuing to encourage and teach children to use their knife and fork correctly at lunchtimes. This is a key life skill which is also detailed in the early learning goals for Reception children. Your support at home with developing this skill would be greatly appreciated. Maybe you could chart your child's progress on Tapestry to share with us.

The children are really enjoying being creative and making models. If you have any small boxes, clean pots, bottle lids or tubes, we would be really grateful if you could save and bring them into school. ### Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)

Wow! What a busy and exciting week it has been in Key Stage 1! We dived head-first into our topic, "When I Was Your Age", which is all about how toys and games have changed throughout history. We had a wonderful, exciting day on Tuesday making Victorian toys. We made peg dolls, pop-up puppets and thoughout history. We had a lovely time and this



puppets and thaumatropes (spinning pictures). We had a lovely time and this shone through when we wrote recounts of the day in English later in the week.



In History, we were exploring the ways that toys had changed over the last 200 years, looking at classic toys, including Furbies, Lego, slinkies, teddy bears and Game Boys. It was fascinating to see what children in different periods of history played with. It also linked nicely with our science work on materials because we were able to see the different materials these toys were made from before plastic was invented. In science we grouped and

classified objects according to the materials they were made from.

We continued to consolidate our knowledge of place value and number in maths, using hundreds, tens and units equipment to represent a number and then partition (split) them up. We also used our knowledge of fractions to calculate fractions of







numbers. We counted a quantity of objects and then linked our understanding to our previous work on sharing to divide them and calculate a half or quarter.

What a fantastic week it has been. We are proud of how hard our children have worked.

### Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

It has been yet another fantastic week in Lower Key Stage Two.



This week, the children started their new topic in science: rocks. During the lesson, the children learnt about the three types of natural rocks (igneous, sedimentary and metamorphic) as well as man-made rock. To begin with, they learnt how the three natural rocks were formed and some of the properties the rocks have as a result of their formation (for example, chalk is very crumbly which is typical of sedimentary rock). Then, the children handled and explored the appearance of

various rocks and classified them as either man-made, sedimentary, igneous or metamorphic.

This half term, the children are continuing with our 'Rivers Deep, Mountains High' geography topic by learning about mountains. Last week, the topic kick started with looking at maps and atlases and exploring how they depict elevated, higher ground and mountains. The children then used the atlases to locate various mountains in the United Kingdom. These included Snowdonia, Pennines, the Cumbrian Mountains and Sperrin Mountains. This week,



the children have continued using the atlases to locate mountains and mountain ranges but have widened their search to across all seven continents. These included the Alps, Himalayas, the Andes, the Rocky Mountains and the Great Dividing Range.



All the children across Lower Key stage Two were excited about starting their new class novel; Just Jack by Kate Scott. So far, from what has been read, the children have learnt that Jack knows a lot about starting a new school because he and his mum move frequently. In the story, Jack is just about to start his sixth school but is not worried because he has a survival guide to fitting in. The children have raised so many questions about the book and Jack already: Will Jack be able to be his true self at his new school? Will he make some genuine friends?

Class 6 and 7 thoroughly enjoyed watching the Class 8 assembly on Friday afternoon. Thank you to all of the parents/carers that attended; we hope you loved it as much as we did.

### Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)

As part of our RE lessons this week, we learnt about Shadaha, a profession of faith; this is the first pillar of Islam. Muslims bear witness to the oneness of God by reciting the creed 'There is no God but God and Muhammad is the Messenger of God.' This simple, yet profound, statement expresses a Muslim's complete acceptance and total commitment to Islam. We learnt that the creed is said three times, in front of an Imam, when someone coverts to Islam and is also spoken to newborn babies. Mu'azzins (prayer callers) include the




Shadaha as part of the adhan (call to prayer) which is usually called from a tower next to the mosque. The first mu'azzin was a man called Bila. He was a loyal Sahabah (companion) to the Prophet Muhammad and consequently one of the earliest converts in the newly-emerging religion of Islam.



In PSHE, we have been considering the impact our choices can have on ourselves, our local community and global communities. We discussed the need to recycle to reduce the amount of waste we produce in order to reduce our reliance on buying new products. Whilst at home and in school, we began to consider the choices that we can make in order to have a less damaging impact on the environment: turn lights off when leaving rooms; walk rather than ask for a lift when the destination is only a short distance away; save water by turning the taps off and much more.

As part of our unit learning about light in science, we looked at the structure of the eye and learnt how all the components work together enabling us to see. We used mirrors to show how the size of our pupil changed in diameter depending on the amount of light entering. We learnt that when light hits the retina (a light-sensitive layer of tissue at the back of the eye), special cells called photoreceptors turn the light into electrical signals. These electrical signals travel from the retina through the optic nerve to the brain. The brain then turns the signals into the images we see.



We are very proud of the way the year 6 pupils have approached their informal assessments and hopefully they will feel more confident about them going forward.
