### Football Update

After the extended winter (that seemed to go on forever), the football season has returned as our teams begin participation in the Primary Cup, which is an FA Cup style knockout competition. We are excited to start adding the names of the players representing our teams, so that we can celebrate our players' achievements.

### RBPS 2 - 2 Westfield (RB Won 3-2 on penalties)

Our Year 3/4 Boys team made their first appearance of the season, beating Westfield 6-5 on penalties, to progress to the last 16 of the Primary Cup. RBPS controlled the first half and were soon two goals to the good, showing a fair reflection for the quality of our play. However, football is a game of two halves and, in the second half, Westfield came back into the game - the second via an unfortunate deflection. The rest of game became end to end as both teams searched for a winner. Fulltime came and went along with ten minutes extra time. Penalties finally separated the teams with RBPS holding their nerve.

### RBPS 1 - 8 Osbaldwick

Our Year 5/6 girls' team, a mixture of both experienced and first time players, showed amazing resilience on a very strange pitch and against a very experienced Osbaldwick team. I was very proud of the resilience and determination shown and on a different day, we could have had three or four more goals.



### **RBPS 4 - 3 Huntinton**

On Friday, our Year 5/6 team came back from the worst possible start, conceding after 30 seconds, to beat Huntington 4-3 in a thrilling contest to progress to the last 16 of the Primary Cup. After such a bad start, RBPS grew into the game and started to create chance after chance with Archie White, Lauren McJannett and Ralphy Waddington pulling the strings in midfield. It was against the run of play when Huntington added a second goal. Alex Hanlon grabbed the all important next goal, just before half time, to breathe life back into their cup bid. The second half saw RBPS turn the tie on its head with two quick goals (both Alex Hanlon) to lead 3-2 before Huntington equalised. Finally, RBPS found a fourth (Alex Hanlon) and managed to see out the game (with more style then Manchester United) thanks to a strong defensive performance from Thomas Hobson, Milo Jackson, Theo Wilson and Noel Gledhill – Nichols (on debut). RBPS set up a last 16 tie with Knavesmire. A huge thank you to Mr Waddington for officiating.

### Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)

Our focus this week has been 'sunflowers'.

During the week, the children have had an opportunity to learn the names of the parts of a plant. They have also explored sunflowers. In literacy, the children used their knowledge of the life cycle of a plant. They wrote some



factual sentences which explained each stage of the life cycle of a sunflower. The children are working very hard to practise their letter formation and to segment words to spell them.

In phonics, we have continued to learn how to read and spell words with adjacent consonants. The children are doing very well with this and enjoying the new challenge. New tricky words learnt this week are, **some**, **come**, **love** and **do**.

In maths, we have continued to explore numbers beyond 10. The children have completed many practical activities like threading beads to match a numeral and identifying the missing number in a sequence of 10-20. They also love practising their skills on the interactive whiteboard. This week, we have also recognised the national day, St George's Day. The children learnt why this day is significant and enjoyed hearing the story of St George and the Dragon.

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## Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)

What a busy week it has been in Key Stage 1! In history, we have continued to learn about the Great Fire of London. We were focussing on historical enquiry skills: learning how to be historians and interpreting evidence to think about what different artefacts and documents could tell us about the events of the past. We learned about how the fire caused radical changes in fire safety that still affect us to this day, such as differences in architecture and city planning.

We also stepped into the role of Samuel Pepys himself, during English lessons this week. We thought about what happened on each day of the fire and what Samuel's experience of it would have been like, from hearing about it to meeting with King Charles II. We used grammatical features such as past tense and first person perspective to write; we added dates, salutations and sign-offs to make our diaries sound more authentic. It was great fun stepping back in time and putting ourselves at the scene.









In maths this week, we have been working on division by sharing into equal groups, using a variety of methods such as practical sharing, using jottings and the use of times table knowledge. We have also be learning about

fractions of both shapes and numbers. Of course, this has given us the opportunity to make the link between fractions and division too.

We have enjoyed our new computing unit, "Making Pictures". This is all about using the painting tools on the computer to create artwork with a variety of effects. We learned a little bit about impressionist styles and pointillism; we then emulated these to create our own artwork, using a variety of brush types, sizes and 'water' effects to change the shades.

### Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

It has been another great week in Lower Key Stage 2.



In PSHE this week, the children have continued to learn about jobs and careers. Last week, the children explored different job sectors and the types of jobs and careers within those sectors. For example, within the education sector, the children listed jobs such as teacher, teaching assistant and headteacher. Building on that this week, the children have learnt about the skills and qualities various jobs require. For instance, an accountant requires financial and mathematical skills and needs qualities such as paying attention to detail, patience and integrity.

The children have continued our WWII 'Dig for Victory' topic this week. Last week, the children learnt about the Battle of Britain; they learnt about the German intention to take control of the skies above the UK so they could invade England. Despite the RAF having fewer aircrafts than the German Luftwaffe, the UK and their allies, won the battle. The end of the Battle of Britain marked the start of the Blitz. Once the Germans realised they could not win against the RAF in the skies, they began bombing many industrial cities across the UK in hope that the UK would





surrender. This week, the children took an in-depth look at the Blitz and started to work on a double page spread. They learnt about when the Blitz began and how civilians in the cities being bombed kept safe. Many people built Anderson shelters in their back gardens, during the Blitz, which they used during the night raids. In London, many people made their way to public shelters including the London underground.

In design and technology, the children have continued to practise their sewing skills using Binca and thread. The children have shown excellent resilience, patience and determination when having a go at running stitch, backstitch and cross stitch.



If you haven't already, please send into school a pair of old, adult-sized ankle or knee length socks that your child can turn into a hand puppet and a small recyclable / disposable plastic bottle that fits inside the sock. 
# Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)



Year 5s in Class 10, have had their Level 1 and Level 2 Bikeability training. Before starting, we were taught about how to maintain our bike and check that it was road worthy. We were also taught how to correctly adjust our helmet and check it for cracks. We then had the opportunity to practise riding, gliding and stopping (in the ready position) whilst still on the playground. This afternoon, we went for our first ride around the local area and learnt about how to be safe when riding on the road.

Thank you to all the Year 5s who applied to be a Wellbeing Ambassador when in Year 6. We were extremely pleased with the quantity and quality of the applications. So much so that there were too many applications which resulted in us having to randomly select the successful children. On Monday, the incumbent Wellbeing Ambassadors began their training with Matt Messias. They talked about what their new role would involve, which adults they could approach for support and started to discuss ways in which they could support potential individuals. Their next meeting, with Matt, will be to workshop potential scenarios that they may encounter.

In PE, all classes have started to learn Danish Longball. It is also known as Swedish Longball; a bat and ball game that is popular in primary schools in the UK. It is a mixture of cricket and baseball, and each team takes turns to bat or field. Danish Longball helps children understand the fundamentals of striking and fielding games in a simple and achievable way. The children learn how to work as part of a



team, and work with their peers to achieve a common goal. As part of the game, children also develop their hand-eye coordination, reaction and response skills through throwing and catching, and fielding placements.
