Reading Challenge

The benefits of using a library

Libraries are wonderful places to spark a love of reading in your child and can be especially helpful for those who are less confident or reluctant to pick up a book. Finding the right story isn't always easy, but spending time in the library allows children to browse freely, try different genres and discover what really captures their interest - all without any cost.



In a world filled with digital distractions, libraries also offer a calm space to switch off. Children can silence their phones, step away from screens and focus fully on reading or other activities. At the same time, libraries provide valuable access to technology for families who may not have the internet or a computer at home. If your child needs to complete online homework or research, the library is an ideal place to go.

With a huge range of books, resources and knowledgeable librarians, children can explore topics that excite them while building skills that support their learning. Many libraries also run sessions, clubs and courses for both adults and children. Our local Haxby & Wigginton Library offers Under-5s Storytime, Lego Club and a café serving a variety of food and drinks.

A Polite Reminder to Help Keep our School Safe

We kindly ask for your support in helping us maintain a safe and calm environment for all our pupils and siblings during drop-off and pick-up times.

Recently, we've noticed a number of children climbing on walls, running across grassy areas, and mounting wooden structures around the school site. While we understand that children are excited and wanting to play with friends, we must ask that they remain on the tarmac playground area only.

Please remind your children:

- **Not to climb on** the wooden outdoor shelter or the new wooden hut on the playground. (They are very welcome to **sit inside** them, but climbing is not allowed.)
- Not to use bikes or scooters on school grounds.
- Not to roam around unsupervised we ask that all children stay within the playground area and are closely supervised by their accompanying adult.

It's important to remember that lessons are still ongoing, and pupils in class need a quiet and focused environment. Above all, we want to ensure the safety of all children on site.

Thank you for your cooperation and continued support in keeping our school a safe and happy place for everyone.


Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)

Following on from our nativity work, we have also continued our 'Let's Celebrate' theme by exploring the Christian story 'The Christmas Story'. The children have focussed on the characters in the story in our areas of provision through small world, cut and stick and writing activities. They have also enjoyed making Christmas story spinners which we hope are helping the children to retell the story.

In **phonics** this week, the teaching focus has been learning the digraphs **sh**, **th**, **ng** and **nk**. The children are continuing to work very hard to learn how to sound out and blend words and are enjoying being able to read labels, captions and short sentences. We are so proud of their enthusiasm and progress.

The children have been practising their writing skills by writing CVC words and beginning to write short captions. They learn to do this by segmenting the word into sounds and then recording the letters in the order which they are heard in the word. For example, web = w-e-b. The children are doing this very well and have begun to write short words independently.





In **maths** this week, we have learnt about the number zero. The children sang songs which counted down to zero, for example, five little speckled frogs and ten green bottles. They also experimented in making zero with their fingers and adding and subtracting zero to other numbers.

Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)




Wow, what a brilliant week Key Stage 1 have had! They have been shining stars this week as they have continued to practise their nativity. We have come together to put the show together, using our hall stage. The narrators have done a super job of reading their lines with a clear voice and the actors have been dazzling in their performances. The dancers have been practising their routines and the musicians have done an amazing job of accompanying the songs. It is

already coming together well and promises to be a fantastic show. We are getting excited and can't wait to share it with our families and friends.

As well as performing amazingly in the nativity, our children have loved their dance lessons with Mrs Topliss. In these sessions, they have been thinking about how they can make shapes, both in pathways on the floor and with their bodies in the air. We have been concentrating on making circles, both with a partner and by ourselves. We have made large circles with our bodies, turning circles and jumping circles, all



whilst thinking creatively how to use different parts of our bodies. We worked with a partner, mirroring or synchronising our movements and put them to music in a sequence to create a shape "sentence". It was lots of fun!



As well as dazzling in the performing arts, our children have been shining as authors too. Linked to our science topic on polar environments, we enjoyed a story called "The Runaway Iceberg". In the story, two penguins go on an adventure of exploration on an iceberg that splits apart. They drift through the sea, trying to get back home, helped by lots of other animals. The children loved sequencing the events of the story and then retold it in their own words, using exciting conjunctions and ambitious vocabulary. They did an

amazing job and really entertained us with their exciting writing.

Well done Key Stage 1. We are in a very interesting and exciting time of year and we are so proud of how well you are meeting every new experience and challenge.

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
Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)


With December almost upon us, the children have ended November with another busy and exciting week.



In P.E. this week, the children have been extremely active as they have competed in the 'Primary Cooper Run Challenge.' This activity involved completing as many 100m laps of the playground as they possibly could within a time limit of twelve minutes. Its aim was to help build up individual fitness and

stamina levels. The children worked in pairs - one child recorded each lap whilst their partner worked up a considerable sweat even in this cold weather and then they swapped over to catch their breath! During the task, the children learnt a great deal about their own fitness levels and the importance of pacing themselves in order to complete the longest distance possible. Well done everyone - the teachers were exhausted just watching and supporting you!





In science, as part of our 'Animals including Humans' topic, the children have been learning all about food chains. As a class, we discussed the meaning of key scientific vocabulary such as herbivores, carnivores, omnivores, prey, predators and primary and secondary consumers. Afterwards, the children used this

knowledge and understanding to create their own food chains by selecting appropriate pictures of plants and animals from a selection that was provided. The children were brilliant at remembering that all food chains need to begin with a producer such as leaves, grass or flowers! They had the added challenge of following set criteria when creating each food chain. For example, one of the food chains, that they made, needed to have a producer, primary consumer and secondary consumer included.

In geography, the children have just begun a new topic entitled 'Rivers Deep, Mountains High'. The first lesson involved the children familiarising themselves with an atlas and the key features that are found inside one, such as the contents page and index. The children then worked in pairs to begin to locate different rivers and mountain ranges within Britain and then around the world.

Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)

As part of our Industrial Revolution topic, we have started to learn about the huge changes brought about by the introduction of railways and locomotives.

This week, we investigated the life of George Stephenson. From a young age it was clear that Stephenson was determined to better himself: he taught himself to read and write, he travelled to Scotland to further his education and, by age 19, he was operating a Newcomen engine. His knowledge of steam engines won him the post of engine wright (chief mechanic) at Killingworth colliery. Later in life, he went on to develop his



own locomotives including the Rocket which won the Rainhill Trials in 1828.



In our RE lessons this week, we explored how different Jewish communities worship and celebrate their faith. Although all synagogues share the same core purpose - to be a place of prayer, learning and community - there are some key differences between Orthodox and Reform synagogues. Orthodox synagogues follow traditional Jewish teachings closely. Men and women usually sit separately during services and prayers are often spoken in Hebrew. The service is led by a rabbi or cantor, and the Torah is read according to long-established customs. The atmosphere is typically formal,

with a strong focus on preserving traditions that have been passed down through generations. In Reform synagogues, men and women sit together and services may include both Hebrew and the English. Music, including instruments, is more commonly used. Despite these differences, both types of synagogues share the same goals: to bring their communities together, teach important values and celebrate Jewish identity. Each offers a meaningful way for Jewish people to connect with their faith.

This week in PE, we took part in an Outdoor and Adventurous Activity called **Cross the River**. The challenge looked simple at first, but we quickly realised that it would take teamwork and careful planning to succeed. Our group had a limited number of mats to use as stepping stones. We spent time discussing ideas, deciding on a route and organising ourselves. Everyone had to communicate clearly and listen to each other's suggestions. Some



of our attempts didn't go as planned but we kept adjusting our strategy. By the end of the session, we had successfully crossed the river. We felt proud of how well we worked as a team and realised that challenges like this really help build confidence, resilience and trust.
