Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)

This week, our dinosaur topic has explored the size of dinosaurs. We have related this to how long our classroom and playground are and the height of a person. We discovered that the Spinosaurus was the largest carnivorous dinosaur and the Brachiosaurus was the largest herbivorous dinosaur. The

children were also interested to learn that some 'dinosaurs' were actually prehistoric reptiles. This included the Plesiosaur and Pterodactyl. Scientists believe these reptiles were alive at the same time as dinosaurs so they are often classed as dinosaurs!

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This week, in phonics, we have revised reading words which have the suffix endings er and est. An example of these are sprinter and softest. We have learnt that adding these endings changes the meaning of the words. Adding er changes the word from a verb to a noun, for example **print – printer**. Adding **est** changes the word into a superlative which is a word that means the most, for example **soft – softest**. We have also reviewed our

Phase 4 learning, prior to carrying out our half-termly assessments next week. We continue to revise and learn how to read and spell the tricky words to, into, all, are they, out, today and one.

In maths, we have practised adding using a variety of resources. The children were introduced to Cuisenaire Rods. These rods represent a number and assist them in solving missing numbers in a number calculation.

We have also continued our understanding of patterns by exploring more

complicated patterns, for example ABBC. These patterns could be colours, for example, Red, Blue, Blue, Green or animals, Pig, Horse, Horse, Dog etc.



In our RE lessons, we have continued to explore how people belong to different groups. This week, the children learnt about the Muslim naming ceremony Agigah. During the ceremony, the baby has prayers whispered into their ear and money is donated to charities in the name of the baby.




Library visit reminder – next week **Class 1** will return and select new books. Next week, this visit will take place on <u>Wednesday</u>..

Tyrannosaurus rex






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Little Wandle Reading Books - Reception/Year 1 & 2

Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)



Many of us were feeling both excited and nervous about the changes ahead but being able to visit our new classrooms with our friends and meet the friendly teams that will be teaching us made us feel a lot better. We played fun games and did some special work all about ourselves. There will be more opportunities to visit our new classes next week.



On the subject of taking the next steps in life, we have been delighted to watch the butterflies emerge from their cocoons this week. In Class 5, this happened right in front of our eyes. We enjoyed watching them flutter and were dazzled by the wonderful patterns on their wings. It was sad, after a few days, to unzip their containers and see them go but also happy to think that they were free to now lay

their own eggs so that the life cycle could continue. Who knows: if you discover caterpillars in your garden over the next few weeks, they could even have come from our insect friends!

It wasn't just our butterflies embarking on an adventure this week either. In English we emerged from Anthony Brown's tunnel in his classic picture book about a boy and a girl who go exploring and end up finding adventure and danger. We started by talking about the atmosphere that the author created and predicted where the tunnel would lead. We had some wonderful (and at times terrifying!) ideas, all inspired by the story start. Eventually, our teachers read the surprising end of the story but not before we had brought our own imagination to life and created our own story ideas.


Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

What a great week Year 3 and 4 have had! We were all very lucky to start our Monday morning off by watching the wonderful performance of 'The Wizard of Oz' by Upper Juniors. Their performance was outstanding and we all thoroughly enjoyed the story line, fabulous acting, super singing and brilliant solos.



In PSHE this week, the children have started their new economic wellbeing topic. They delved into the various ways cash can be represented / obtained. These included debit card, credit card, loans, contactless and cheque. Once they learnt about the key features of each of these ways to pay, they discussed the advantages and disadvantages of them.

This week, the children concluded their class novel 'The Firework Maker's Daughter'. They were relieved to find out Lalchand and Lila were successful in the firework competition and won the approval of the other firework makers. This resulted in them winning the prize of the thousand coins and gold cup as well as the King sparing Lalchand's life. By the end of the story, after dreaming about it her whole life, Lila finally became a fully-fledged firework maker. 

We have had some fantastic feedback from the new Year 7s and their day out to their various secondary schools. They talked excitedly about the lessons they had undertaken and the new friends they had made.


